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




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ADDRESS

TO THE

TEACHERS of the LATIN TONGUE.

GENTLEMEN,

T is with very great deference to your abilities, the compiler of this Dictionary presumes to address such competent judges of the utility and merit of his labours. He does not attempt to derogate from the value, which other Lexicographers have set upon their own works, nor to rejudice the reader in his favour, by assuming a character to which he could not make out a just

nd fair claim in the republic of letters.

In a course of fifty years, Gentlemen! the compiler of this work has been constantly employed ther as a private tutor, a schoolmaster, or a writer for, and a corrector of the press. In these emloyments, and prepared by a regular Academical Education ten years at College, he has had reat opportunities to reason both upon the manner of Education, and upon the means, or books fied in the schools of this kingdom; to instruct the learner in the knowledge of Classical Learning, nd to render both the English into Latin, and the Latin into English: and thereby to point out be embarrasiments and obstacles, which frequently perplexed, and sometimes totally discouraged a Joung Beginner, in the pursuit of the Latin Tongue. Of which there is no need to mention any me, that requires greater attention amongst the Teachers of the Latin Classics, than the Dictionaries whished from time to time, for more than a Century past, for that purpose. In a comparative view hose books may be said to have the advantage of one another, as being to be purchased at a less pice. But taking them altogether it will be found, that they are calculated more for the emolument of the publisher, than for the instruction and profit of the purchaser; being all, more or less, alphabetical digest of superfluous etymologies and words, that take the place of more material arts of a Dictionary; which, by increasing the bulk, lay a tax upon learning, that puts it out of he power of the lower class of people to supply their children with such books as often as they by be wanted.

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You will bear witness, That a Tyro in Latin wants no more than the part of speech, and the construction of the word. Learned etymologies, and the great number of quotations or authorities, which fill up above half of those performances, are not the care and object of a latinist, till he has

attained a copia verborum to enable him to construe, translate, and to parse.

His practice, and the laborious hours the author spun out in his corrections and improvements, made in the last edition of Littleton's and the several editions of Coles's Dictionary, in which he was solely concerned for the publishers, enabled him to discover the method to remedy the inconveniencies of those and such like voluminous Dictionaries. The Dictionary compiled by Ainsworth, his worthy fellow-labourer in the classical world, which succeeded to Littleton in the schools; and those abridgements of that voluminous Thesaurus by Mr. Thomas, and by Young, to supplant Coles's Dictionary, did, in nowise, remove the complaint. These novel Dictionaries confirmed the necessity of compiling another, more handy and intelligible for a schoolboy, and every beginner in the pursuit of the Latin tongue; and of such a price that it might be purchased by all lovers of learning, without throwing away double the money.

You know that a boy requires no more at his entrance into Latin, than to have a Dictionary containing all the words in the classical authors, with their denominations, whether a substantive or adjective, noun or pronoun, verb or participle, adverb, conjunction, preposition with its case, or interjection; how declined or conjugated, and with their signification, as used by divers authors, in the English Tongue. Now if there be no more required, till they have obtained a copia worborum, to enable a learner to construe and parse a Latin author; why has the fashion so long prevailed in the grammar-schools, to increase the expense of parents in the purchase of those other parts, which fill up our voluminous Dictionaries, and puzzle, consound, and often prevent the

learner from attaining the true meaning of the word he looks for ?

Again, his affiltance to perform an exercise by turning English into Latin, is not to be sought for in these Dictionaries, "that are fraught with a great number of English words and phrases, as the Reverend Mr. Young expresses it, grown quite obsolete, many of them interpreted in a wrong sense and very injudiciously translated into Latin." Therefore it has been a principal care in this work to avoid those errors and incongruities, to reduce all words and phrases to a modern standard, and to give such Latin words for the English, as can be warranted by the authorities of truly classical writers

From these premises the author appeals to your candour for your approbation of his labours, and intreats the admission of this little Dictionary into your schools; as a means to relieve you from sauch fatigue, and to promote the instruction of your scholars. Which being the chief objects of this plan, will sufficiently compensate the labour of the author, who has the honour to subscribe himself.
